Friends of the Library (FOL) <u>Clay Dishon</u> <u>Ruth DeBoer</u>	 Mr. Dishon reported on the Friends of the Library Report in Ms. DeBoer's absence: No July Meeting. Continue to work towards searching for and bringing on some new Friends Board members. Annual Meeting scheduled for November 4 – Special guest speaker is local reviewer, critic and instructor Ed Slipek, who will give a talk about the Richmond Public Library.
Library Foundation <u>Susan Revere</u> <u>Scott Firestine</u>	 Ms. Revere reported on the Library Foundation Report as follows: Grant Activity/Partnership Updates: The Foundation is excited to announce the \$30,000 grant awarded by Virginia Museum of History and Culture's Commonwealth History Fund, supported by Dominion Energy for a Community Memory Fellow. This grant falls within the Strategic Plan focus area Uniquely Richmond. Thank you to Chair Yates for his letter of consent in support of the application, to Christine Peterson for reviewing and strengthening our application, and to Sheron Carter-Gunter for her support as well. We look forward to sharing more information with you in the coming months. The Foundation submitted a grant request to Dominion Charitable Foundation in support of
	• The Foundation submitted a grant request to Dominion Charitable Foundation in support of the YAVA and RVA Reads Programs.

	REPORTS (CONTINUED)
Library Foundation (Continued) Susan Revere	• Dr. Greg Hundley and his team at VCU's Pauley Heart Center are working with the Foundation to support RVA Reads during Heart Health Month in February 2023 with <i>The Busy Body Book</i> , by Lizzy Rockwell. Many of RPL's RVA Reads partnerships are in historically under resourced neighborhoods where significant health disparities and outcomes exist.
<u>Scott Firestine</u>	• Beginning August 1, RPL teams up with Virginia Credit Union on a financial literacy pilot program at Broad Rock and West End Branch Libraries. The kiosks contain a collection of approximately 80 multi-lingual titles about important financial concepts appropriate for children pre-K – 6th grade. Studies have shown that many money habits are already in place by age 7. These books and the programs around them support conversations about financial decision making.
Administration	Highlights and Additions to Director's Report: Mr. Firestine reported on the highlights from the Director's Report and Statistical Report as follows:
<u>Scott Firestine</u>	• State Aid Waiver Update: In May 2022, Mr. Firestine applied for State Aid Waiver due to local support decrease during the pandemic. He had to explain what had happened and how funding has been/will be restored. After confirmation, the State Library was satisfied and approved the waiver.
	• The At Home newsletter is up and running again.
	 RPL was selected by the State Library to pilot a program called Career Online High School (COHS). This will allow adult students in Richmond to take online schooling, designed in compliance with VA education standards, to acquire the true high school diploma. During the pilot, the cost of the program will be underwritten by LVA. Other VA Libraries currently hosting COHS include Prince William, Fairfax, Chesapeake, Virginian Beach, and Norfolk. Relevant results include: 81% of the COHS graduates in Virginia have pursued post-secondary degrees, finding a pathway to community college and skilled trades. Each graduate impacts their community with increased carnings and loss dependence on
	 Each graduate impacts their community with increased earnings and less dependence on government assistance.
	The State Library discovered the impact of this program and secured funding for a select group of Virginia libraries with the highest need in their communities (Frederick County, Lexington, and Richmond) to offer scholarships. This is an opportunity for RPL to participate and supports our strategic goal of Lifelong Learning.

Finance Chair	Mr. Firestine reported on the end-of-year close out with the City:
<u>Scott Firestine</u> <u>Garrett Sawyer</u>	 There was a surplus at the end of the fiscal year. All staff received a 5% increase on their first pay check for the new fiscal year. The City addressed some compression in certain job classifications. The City initiated a starting wage of \$17.00/hourly, which is higher than surrounding localities. Collective bargaining was approved by the City.
Facilities Chair <u>Janet Woody</u> <u>Gail Zwirner</u> <u>Scott Firestine</u>	Ms. Woody reported the Committee was still working on the conceptual document. She also mentioned the architect had to complete another form for the Urban Design Committee. The Urban Design Committee will meet August 2 to continue discussions.
Governance Chair Emily Altman	Ms. Altman reported there were no responses in changing Committee responsibilities by members. Mr. Yates mentioned all members would continue working within their respective current Committees.

Advocacy: Wrap up – Ms. Peterson reminded everyone if they have not reached out to thank their respective Councilmembers, to please do so as soon as possible.

American Library Association (ALA) – Ms. Peterson mentioned the ALA has a few set a side groups, which include Trustees, Foundation, Friends, and Library Directors called United for Libraries. Their Annual Conference theme is Equity, Inclusion, and Diversity (EID). Mr. Firestine and Ms. Peterson will be presenting at the ALA Conference on August 10 on EID.

NEW BUSINESS

RPL100: Mr. Dishon gave a brief update on the Committee meeting to develop public programming recognizing 100 years of the Richmond Public Library. Library/Community Services Manager Ben Himmelfarb of the Main Library and Mr. Dishon are leading the effort. All Branches are represented and participating on the Committee as well as Foundation, LBOT, and Friend members. Foundation Member Dontrese Brown is donating his time and expertise to work with the Committee on a Message, Voice & Personality (MVP) development project. The workshop will address brand design and creative strategy around the library: How we tell our story and engage with patrons and others.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:46pm by unanimous consensus from the members that were present in the meeting.

- **Community Memory Fellow**: Community Memory Fellow position was posted on September 1-23, 2022, to the City HR Jobs website. This position is a one year grant funded fellowship that will assist the "Uniquely Richmond" goal of the RPL 2022-2027 Strategic Plan:
 - Establishing Richmond History Room as a primary starting point for historical research on the City of Richmond.
 - Expanding local history collections for students, researchers, and enthusiasts in Special Collections.
 - Producing public programs related to Richmond history.
 - Developing an oral history collaborative strategy to preserve Richmond voices.
 - Connecting RPL with other institutions, organizations, and individuals who do public history work.

RPL100 Committee Charge and Membership

Purpose

The RPL100 Committee will plan and develop public programming recognizing Richmond Public Library's 100th year.

Charge

The RPL100 Committee reports to the Library Director and is responsible for planning, developing, and presenting public programs during RPL's 100th year of service to Richmond. The Committee will provide the Library Director with a schedule of programming throughout RPL's Centennial Year, November 2022 through November 2023.

Membership

- Library/Community Services Manager, Richmond Public Main Library, chair
- One library staff member representing each of the eight branches, appointed by the Library Director guided by the diversity of the group, key experiences, and connections related to RPL.
- One member from the RPL Board of Trustees, appointed by the Board of Trustees
- One member from the Friends of Richmond Public Library, appointed by the Friends Board of Directors
- One member from the Richmond Public Library Foundation, appointed by the Foundation Board
- One member representing the Richmond Public Library Administration

Member Terms

- Membership begins July 2022 and concludes January 2024.
- The Committee will meet regularly as Committee business requires, beginning in July 2022 and concluding in January 2024.

Areas of Responsibility

The Committee will:

- Assemble and craft an engaging, relevant, accurate, inclusive, and thorough history of RPL's first 100 years of formal existence as a public institution. The Committee should create this history in a democratic, transparent way that will increase the collective sense of ownership of the Library as a public good in Richmond.
- Ensure representation from all branches, neighborhoods, and areas of the city throughout the project. The work itself and the results of RPL100 belongs to all of us, just as the library does.
- Seek information and insight into the past from a wide range of sources, including but not limited to:
 - Institutional, city, and other public records or materials
 - Published documents like newspapers, reports, and notices
 - Unpublished documents like diaries or personal writings
 - Books and other secondary sources on Richmond's history
 - Oral histories and stories from past and current residents and library users
 - Photographs from any and all sources
- Correlate historical inquiry and storytelling with the five focus areas of the 2022-2027 Strategic Plan: Accessible Libraries, Early Literacy, Lifelong Learning, Organizational Strength, and Uniquely Richmond.
- Plan events, exhibits and other material relevant to telling the story of RPL at 100 years.
- Develop an evaluation and report on Centennial Year activities by January 31, 2024 to submit to the Library Director.

Guiding Principles

- 1. RPL100 programming and events will be forthright on all aspects of the Library's history, including the history of segregationist policies and the Library's role in maintaining white supremacy in Richmond.
- 2. Richmond Public Library is committed to advancing equity, diversity, and inclusion. We recognize that awareness and transformation must occur on the individual, collective, and institutional levels. A fuller, truer, richer accounting of the Library's history can help facilitate this growth and learning within our own ranks, with our patrons, and for the city as a whole.

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MARLON JAMES

Award-winning Novelist and Educator



Marlon James won the 2015 Man Booker Prize for Fiction for A Brief History of Seven Killings, making him the first Jamaican author to take home the U.K.'s most prestigious literary award. In the work, James combines masterful storytelling with brilliant skill at characterization and an eye for detail to forge a bold novel of dazzling ambition and scope. He explores Jamaican history through the perspectives

of multiple narrators and genres: the political thriller, the oral biography, and the classic whodunit confront the untold history of Jamaica in the 1970's, with excursions to the assassination attempt on reggae musician Bob Marley, as well as the country's own clandestine battles during the cold war. James cites influences as diverse as Greek tragedy, William Faulkner, the LA crime novelist James Ellroy, Shakespeare, Batman and the X-Men. Writing for *The New York Times*, Michiko Kakutani said of A *Brief History of Seven Killings*, "It's epic in every sense of that word: sweeping, mythic, over-the-top, colossal and dizzyingly complex. It's also raw, dense, violent, scalding, darkly comic, exhilarating and exhausting—a testament to Mr. James's vaulting ambition and prodigious talent." In addition to the Man Booker Prize, A *Brief History of Seven Killings* won the American Book Award, the Anisfield-Wolf Book Prize, the OCM Bocas Prize for Caribbean Literature, the Minnesota Book Award, and was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award.

Marlon James' first novel, John Crow's Devil, tells the story of a biblical struggle in a remote Jamaican village in the 1950s. Though rejected 78 times before being accepted for publication, John Crow's Devil went on to become a finalist for the Los Angeles Times Book Prize and the Commonwealth Writers Prize, as well as a New York Times Editor's Choice. His second novel, The Book of Night Women, is about a slave women's revolt on a Jamaican plantation in the early 19th century. The work won the 2010 Dayton Literary Peace Prize, Minnesota "[Marlon james] is a virtuoso ... [the novel is] an epic of postcolonial fallout, in jamaica and elsewhere, and America's participation in that history. ... the book is not only persuasive but tragic, though in its polyphony and scope it's more than that....It makes its own kind of music, not like Marley's, but like the tumult he couldn't stop."

Book Award, and was a finalist for the 2010 National Book Critics Circle Award in fiction, as well as an NAACP Image Award. His best-selling book, Black Leopard, Red Wolf, is the first in the Dark Star Trilogy, a fantasy series set in African legend. Black Leopard, Red Wolf received the Ray Bradbury Prize for Science Fiction, Fantasy and Speculative Fiction from the Los Angeles Times Book Prizes, the 2020 Locus Award for Horror, was a finalist for the 2019 National Book Award in the Fiction category, and was named one of the Washington Post's 10 Best Books of 2019. The

second book in the trilogy is Moon Witch, Spider King (Riverhead Books, February 15, 2022).

James' short fiction and nonfiction have been anthologized in *Bronx Noir, The Book of Men: Eighty Writers on How to Be a Man* and elsewhere, and have appeared in *Esquire, Granta, Harper's, The Caribbean Review of Books* and other publications. His widely read essay, "From Jamaica to Minnesota to Myself," appeared in the *New York Times Magazine*. In early 2016 his viral video Are you racist? 'No' isn't a good enough answer received millions of hits. James hosts a popular podcast about literature with Jake Morrissey called *Marlon and Jake Read Dead People*. Marlon James will write and executive produce *Get Millie Black* a 6-part crime drama set in Jamaica for movie channel HBO and the UK's Channel 4.

Marlon James was born in Kingston, Jamaica in 1970. He graduated from the University of the West Indies in 1991 with a degree in Language and Literature, and from Wilkes University in Pennsylvania in 2006 with a Masters in creative writing. He lives in Minneapolis, Minnesota and teaches English and creative writing at Macalester College. In 2018 Marlon James received an American Academy of Arts and Letters Award in Literature. In April 2019 he was named one of *Time Magazine*'s 100 Most Influential People of 2019 in the Pioneers category.

In his presentations, James addresses topics related to writing and the writing process, as well as issues pertaining to the history of the Caribbean, race and gender in the US and UK, and youth subcultures as expressed in literature and music such as hip-hop and reggae.


