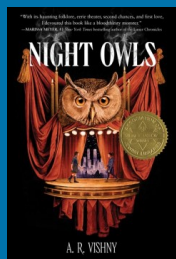

by A. R. Vishny

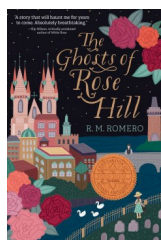

by Cambria Gordon

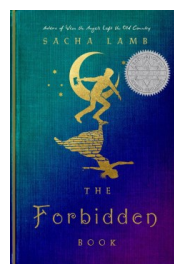

by Hannah Reynolds

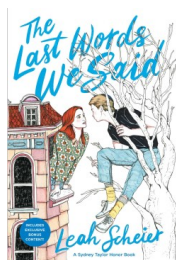

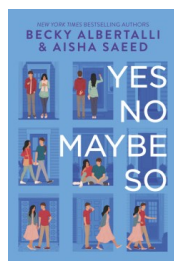


When the Angels Left the Old Country

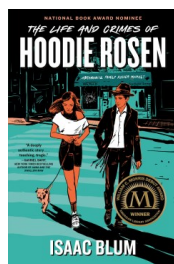
difficult as what they've left behind.

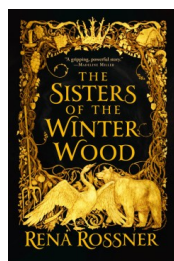


The Life and Crimes of Hoodie Rosen
