







Mean Jean is the biggest bully on the school playground until a new girl arrives and challenges Jean's status as the Recess Queen. By the author of Loud Emily.

by Jacqueline Woodson



by Trudy Ludwig




Sixth-grade friends Lyla and Jamie, both new to their school, stand up for each other when a clique of popular girls bullies them online.

by Anna Dewdney


Following their teacher's lead, Llama Llama speaks to Gilroy Goat and tells him he should not act like a bully on the playground.

by Jane Lynch




Even when the class bully at her new school makes fun of her, Molly remembers what her grandmother told her and she feels good about herself.

by Lisa Graff


