






by Lucie Félix


Using die-cut pages the story explores the shapes and colors of an apple tree through the passing of the seasons.

by Amélie Faliere


Animals in playful poses form such common shapes as circles, triangles, and squares.

by Kelly L. Bingham



by Jane Brockert


Describes the difference between flat and solid shapes, and identifies objects with these different shapes, including rectangular bricks and cube-shaped candies.

by Diana Murray



by Lois Ehlert


In a farm full of colors, shapes, and magical animals, a die-cut rooster is transformed into a duck, and then on the next page, the duck becomes a chicken.

by Dawn Sirett


With padded covers; simple, labeled images; and an amazing range of novelty textures, this colorful series will get babies excited about books as they learn about the world around them.


This wordless photo essay captures various shapes in different sizes as they are seen in the everyday things in the world in which we live.

by Amy Krouse Rosenthal



by Jerry Pallotta


Introduces the characteristics and activities of insects through the various shapes made by leafcutter ants, as well as demonstrating these forms with other insects and spiders.

by Ellen Stoll Walsh


Three mice make a variety of things out of different shapes as they hide from a scary cat.
